## **From the Pastor**

### **Rebuild My Church**

In the wake of the fire that heavily damaged Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris two weeks ago close to one billion dollars was pledged to fund its rebuilding within hours. Most of that money was pledged by several French multibillionaire industrialists. While that is a wonderful sign of generosity and of the importance to the French identity of that beautiful building, we must remember that it is a building. Our Catholic faith isn't based on buildings or imperfect leaders but on Jesus Christ Crucified and Resurrected from the Dead. The same Jesus Christ we celebrate during this Easter Season.

We are at a point where our Church needs rebuilding especially in its spiritual sense. The clergy sexual abuse scandal along with growing secularization and a focus on materialism in our society has left our Church crippled.

The need to rebuild our Church reminds me of the story of St. Francis of Assisi's life. As a young man he was praying in the derelict Church of San Damiano when he felt the figure of Christ in an icon of the crucifixion say to him, "Francis rebuild my church." St. Francis thought Jesus meant the chapel itself. He went around the town of Assisi begging for stones to rebuild the physical building that was the church of San Damiano.

It was only after all this effort to rebuild a physical chapel that St. Francis realized that God was actually calling him to rebuild the spiritual Church that was suffering much like our Church today. Francis founded the Order of Friars Minor, known as the Franciscans, the Poor Clares, an order of Religious Sisters, and the Third Order Franciscans, a lay association of men and women who live in the world but are dedicated to the Franciscan way of life. St. Francis rebuilt the spiritual church too.

In a similar manner the impulse to rebuild Notre Dame Cathedral, one of the world's most beloved symbols of our Catholic faith, can also have a positive effect on efforts to rebuild the Church spiritually. Immediately after the fire, like many people, I felt as if I wanted to donate towards the reconstruction too. After hearing of the amount pledged towards reconstruction, I had second thoughts. I have decided that any money I would have contributed would be better spent towards the rebuilding of the spiritual Church.

So, I have decided to increase my donation to the upcoming Catholic Charities Appeal here in our diocese. I feel that the Church will be better served if the money I would have donated were to go towards helping the poor and disadvantaged right here in our own area. At times critics unjustly accuse Catholics of not doing enough to help our community. I feel it isn't that we don't do enough but that much of what we do goes overlooked. The Catholic Charities Appeal is one of the sources of funding for outreach by local Catholics to the needy of our community.

Registered parishioners of Holy Redeemer Parish received a letter from me sent on behalf of the 2019 Catholic Charities Appeal. In the letter I asked for your generous support for the Appeal. If you did not get a letter there are extra mailings and pledge cards in the pews. Please take one and prayerfully consider your generous donation to this year's Catholic Charities Appeal.

Last year 220 Holy Redeemer parishioners donated \$51,519.75 to the Catholic Charities Appeal. Hopefully even more parishioners will take the opportunity to reach out to the needy of our diocese and help rebuild our Church in faith and hope with a generous contribution to the 2019 Catholic Charities Appeal.
